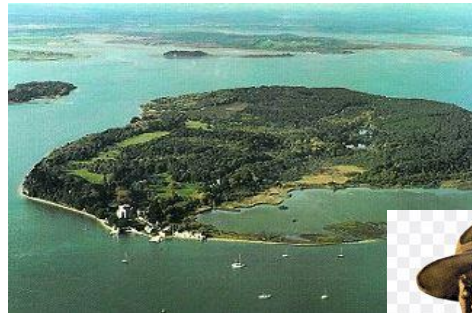

Milestones in Scouting

1857 Robert Baden-Powell (B-P) born
1899 Seige of Mafeking
1907 Brownsea Island experimental camp. **Scouting begins**
1908 B-P publishes Part 1 of Scouting for Boys
1909 11,000 attend a Scout rally at Crystal Palace, London
1910 The "Boy Scouts Association" formed
1910 Sea Scouts formed
1910 Girl Guiding begins
1910 Boy Scouts of America started
1912 The Boy Scouts Association incorporated throughout the British Empire
1916 Scout Jack Cornwell (16) posthumously awarded Victoria Cross
1916 Junior section (Wolf Cubs) started
1918 Senior section (Rover Scouts) started
1919 Gilwell Park becomes Scout HQ
1920 The first World Jamboree held at Olympia, London
1922 Formation of The World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM)
1931 First Rover Scout Moot at Kandersteg, Switzerland
1932 The first Gang Show produced by Ralph Reader
1941 B-P dies in Kenya
1941 Air Scouts officially recognised
1945 "The Road Ahead" introduces a new structure to Scouting
1946 Senior Scout section launched
1949 First "Bob-a-job" week
1966 Promise and Law simplified.
1976 Changes to programme and uniform. Name changed to The Scout Association
1976 Girls admitted the the senior (Venture Scout) section
1982 Extoree camp integrates Scouts with special needs
1982 Beavers introduced throughout UK
1986 Beavers become Beaver Scouts
1991 All sections become mixed
2002 New uniform and programme
2003 New Adult Training Scheme
2009 Bear Grylls becomes Chief Scout
2016 25% female membership in UK
2017 40 million Scouts worldwide in 169 National Scout Associations (WOSM)
